To the student:

Welcome to the Magic of Music Theory! Did you know that when you write things on paper it helps you remember them? This book is to help you remember things that you have learned in your lesson about your viola, and you learn how to read and write music. If you need help you can always ask your practice partner, or your teacher will help. When you finish this book, you will know and understand more about your viola and playing music. It's like magic, the magic of music theory!

To the practice partner:

You are the viola hero. Practicing isn't always fun, and it's not always easy. But in this journey of learning to play the viola, you get to walk alongside a child and give them the gift of music that will last for a lifetime.

Depending on age and reading ability, you may need to assist the student with their assignments. You can learn along with them. Don't be afraid to help and lead the student to the answer. Your child may not grasp it the first time. That's ok! You will find a lot of review built in through out the book. With repetition and review they will begin to understand and remember. This is the learning process.

Keep theory time short! You can choose to do the lesson at the end of one practice session, or you could choose do a little bit each day. It's up to you. Ask your teacher their preference on the "What Do You Hear?" pages. You can complete them in the lesson, access videos online or download free mp3 tracks. The answers are given at the end of each question on the video/track, so that the student gets immediate feedback in the learning process. Enjoy the magic of learning music theory!

To the teacher:

I created this series because I wanted to engage a different part of students' thinking in the music learning process. The worksheets also gave me data for how they were processing and understanding. Many good theory curriculums approach the subject from a keyboard perspective. This makes it hard for young students who are not taking keyboard lessons. I found I was using valuable lesson time to explain theory pages. I needed something they could do at home, apply to their violin playing, and that only required a short explanation in the lesson. The parent could also assist if needed.

I am a Suzuki teacher. So, my approach to teaching is that students first learn to play the instrument, then learn to read, then learn to write/notate. Their note reading and writing (theory) level will be behind their playing level. I would encourage teachers to put students in a theory level below the note reading level. Students gain confidence when the workbook reinforces concepts that they already know and can execute on the instrument. You will find that the concepts are approached first from the music alphabet, then moved onto the fingerboard, and finally moved onto the staff.

The aural skills pages are designed to teach rhythmic and melodic dictation in small steps. The "What Do You Hear?" pages can be done in the lesson, through online videos, or free mp3 tracks. (Visit www.horsehairmusic.com to download tracks.) Suggested listening and recordings are linked to online videos, but feel free to select a different recording or artist to share with your students. I hope these workbooks help your studio and your students to thrive and flourish in their musical journeys.

Lesson 2

The violin, viola, cello, and bass are members of the **string family**. The **violin** is the smallest member and plays the highest notes. The **viola** [vee-o-luh] is a little bigger than the violin and plays 5 notes lower than the violin. The **cello** [chel-oh] sounds lower than both the violin and viola. Cellists sit down and rest the instrument between their knees to play. The **double bass** is the largest member of the string family and plays the lowest notes. Sometimes it is called bass (like *baseball*) for short.

Chamber music is when a small group of people play together. Chamber music was originally written to be performed in small settings, like homes, for family and friends rather than for large audiences in theaters or churches. When 2 people play music together it is called a **duet** [doo-et]. When 3 people play together it is called a **trio** [tree-oh]. When 4 people play together it is called a **quartet** [core-tet]. Most often a **string quartet** has 2 violins, 1 viola, and 1 cello. The violinist who plays the melody is called the **first violin** or Violin 1. The violinist who plays the harmony is called the **second violin**, or Violin 2. But the first violin doesn't always have the melody, sometimes a composer will pass the melody to the other instruments in the quartet. Since there is no conductor for chamber music, string quartet sits close together in a semi-circle. This helps them to play together because they can hear and see each other.

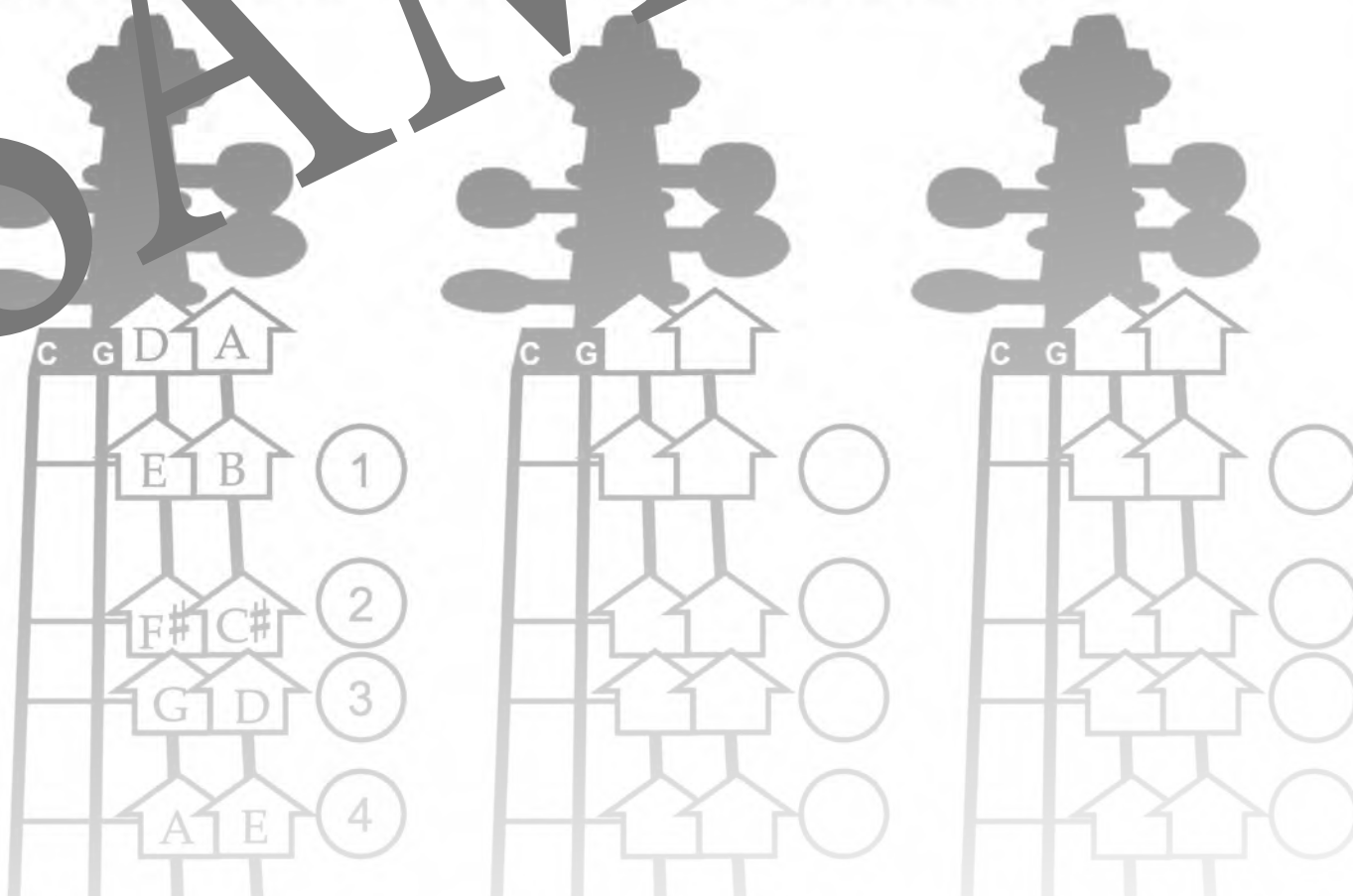

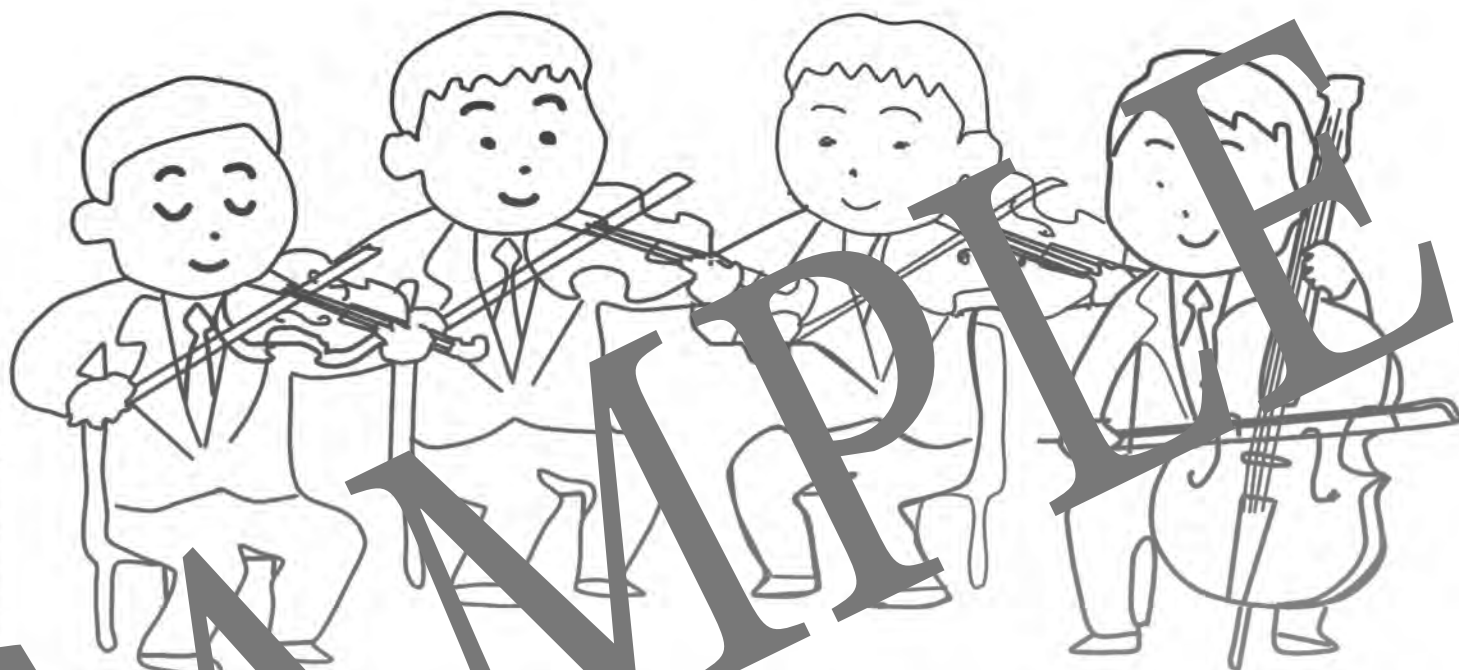

Lesson 3

Rhythm [rih-them] is how long or short we hold a pitch. Rhythm is measured and counted in beats. The number of beats each note gets is printed in the hearts.

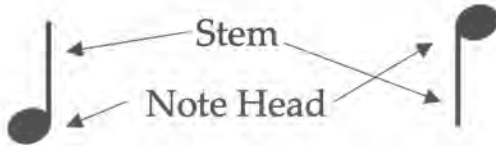

Step 1: Draw a circle, the note head.

Step 2: Color it in.

Pencils were very expensive and rare in the 1600s. Composers dipped pens in ink to write music. These pens had wide nibs (tips). This meant that the thickness of the lines changed.



Today, we use pencils to write music. One thin line is what handwritten music should look like. You don't need to color the sides of the note.



Lesson 5

Dynamics means volume. We use Italian words to show what dynamic to play. **Forte** [for-tay] means loud. **Piano** [pee-an-o] means soft. **Mezzo Forte** [met-zo for-tay] means medium loud. **Mezzo Piano** [met-zo pee-an-o] means medium soft. Only the first letter of each word is written in italics in the music and is placed under the staff.

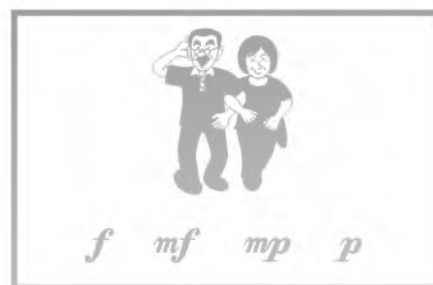
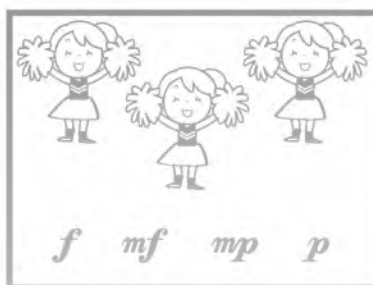
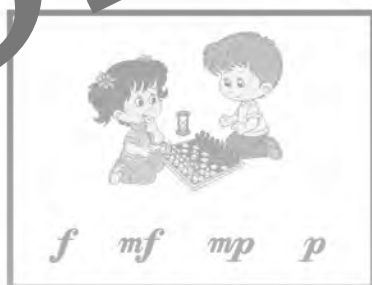
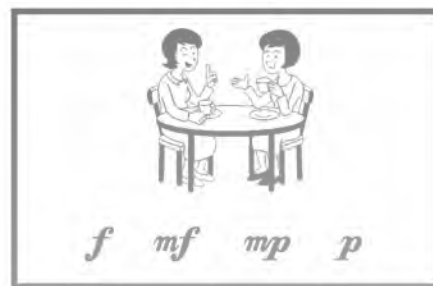
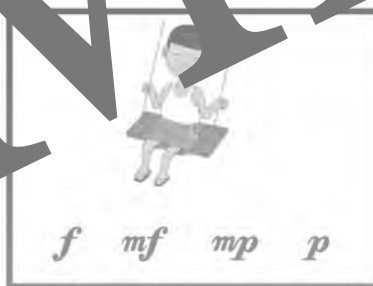
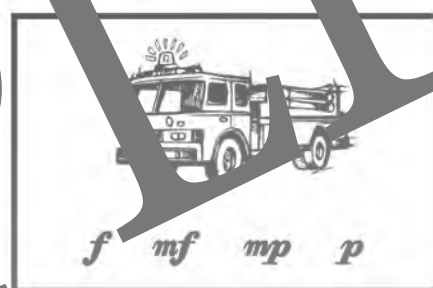

Crescendo [creh-shen-dough] means to play gradually louder. **Diminuendo** [dih-min-you-en-dough] means to play gradually softer. A crescendo or a diminuendo sign looks like an alligator mouth! The small, narrow end of the symbol is the soft side. The wide-open end of the symbol is the loud side.

Treble Clef

Violinists read music in the **treble clef**. **Treble** means high. The treble clef shows the high notes on the staff. It is also called the "G-Clef."



Alto Clef **Tenor Clef**

The **alto clef** and the **tenor clef** are the same symbol! This clef is also called the "C-Clef." The little arrow in the middle points to where C lives. Violists read music in the alto clef.



Bass Clef

This is the **bass clef**. We pronounce the name, "bass," like "base" in baseball. Sometimes it is called the "F-Clef." Cellists and bassists read music in the bass clef.



How to Draw a Treble Clef or "G-Clef"

Music Note Bowling



Preparing to play:

1. Cut out each card and cut down the center on the dotted line.
2. Group the cards with staff notes in one pile, and the cards with bowling balls in another pile.
3. Take the staff note cards and spread them out on the floor or table face down.
4. Take the bowling ball cards and spread them out on the floor face down.

How to play with one player:

1. Turn one card over in each group. If the letter on the bowling ball does not match the staff note, turn both cards back over, face down.
2. Continue turning one card over in each group until you find a match.
3. Your goal is to match all the staff cards to the correct letter on the bowling ball card.

How to play with two or more players:

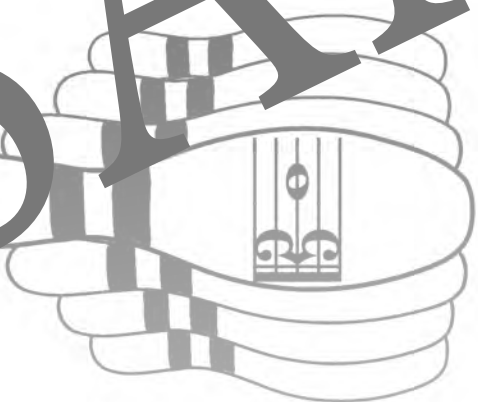
1. The first player turns over one bowling ball card and one staff card. If the cards match, that player takes both the cards and sets them aside. If the cards do not match, the player turns both cards over, and his turn is over.
2. If the player has a match, he takes another turn. If the player does not have a match, the next player takes a turn looking to find a match.
3. Continue until all the cards in both piles have been matched.

?? The viola is made from different kinds of wood. The top of the viola is commonly cut from spruce. The back, ribs, sides, and neck are cut out of maple. The fingerboard, tailpiece, and pegs are usually made from ebony. Ebony wood is naturally black and is strong and light. Sometimes viola makers use boxwood for the tailpiece and pegs. A person who makes stringed instruments or repairs stringed instruments is called a **luthier** [loo-thee-er].

Stringed instruments are very old instruments. There were types of bowed instruments as early as 800 AD in Arabia, China, Spain, and France. But the first written records of luthiers are from the 1500s. Two luthiers from northern Italy, **Andrea Amati** from Cremona and **Gasparo Bertolotti** from Brescia, are some of the first known luthiers. A viola made by Andrea Amati in 1553 still exists today and is displayed at the National Music Museum in Vermillion, South Dakota.

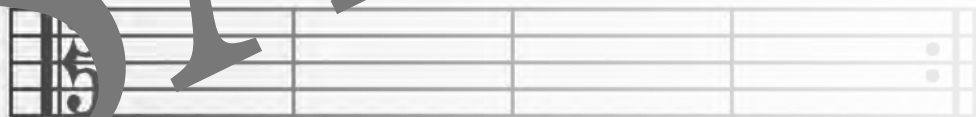
The staff lines are divided with **bar lines** that create **measures**. Bar lines are drawn from line 5 down to line 1. Bar lines help our eyes track the notes. A bar line is drawn at the beginning of the staff. At the end of the music, you will see a **double bar line**. A **double bar line** is one thin line, and one thick line.

The top number tells us how many beats are in each measure. The bottom number tells us what kind of note gets one beat.
A 4 on the bottom means the quarter note gets 1 beat.

Tone is sound that the viola makes when it plays. How each note starts and ends is called **articulation**. For stringed instruments, the bow does most of the articulation work. **Detaché** [day-tah-shay] means separated. This is the basic bow stroke we use to play our instrument.

■ This symbol means to use a **down bow**. A down bow pulls the bow from frog to toward the tip.

∨ This symbol means to use an **up bow**. An up bow pushes the bow from tip toward the frog.



The Italian word **legato** means smooth and connected. Stringed instruments can play legato with separate bows or by playing 2 or more notes in 1 bow stroke. This is called a **slur**. A slur is marked in music by a curved line connecting the note heads. Slurs are drawn above or below the staff by the note heads opposite of the stems. If the stems are going different directions, the slur is always drawn above the staff.

Staccato means short or detached. Staccato is the opposite of legato. To play staccato we stop the bow between every note. Staccato is written in the music by placing a dot centered above or below the notehead. The dot can be placed above or below the staff or in a space on the staff.

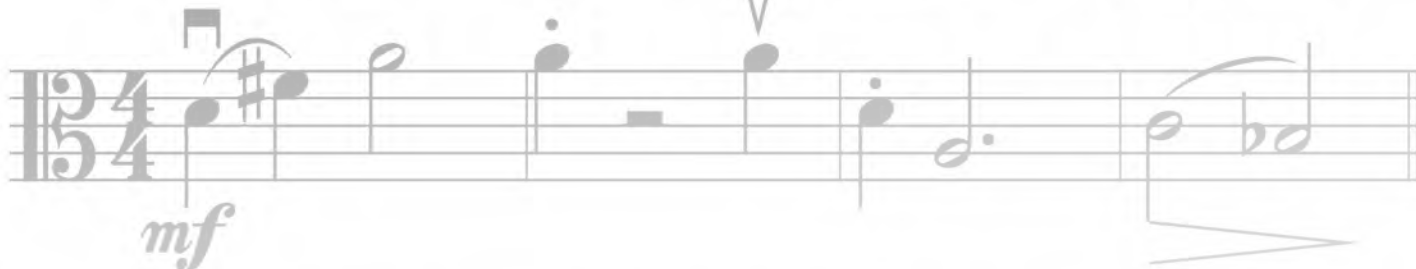

Bass Clef – cellos read music using this clef; sometimes called the “F-clef” because the clef points to “F” line on the staff. (p. 23, 25, 91)

Chamber Music – a small group of people play together. (p.9)

Crescendo – [dynamic sign] grow gradually louder. (p. 17, 38, 67)

Detaché – [bow stroke] separate bows. (p. 86)

Diminuendo – [dynamic sign] grow gradually softer. (p. 17, 38, 67)

Duet – two people playing together. (p. 9, 52)

Dotted Half Note – gets 3 beats in 4/4 time. (p. 12, 37, 38)

Double Bar Line – a thin line followed by a thick line; always found at the end of a piece. (p. 59)

Down Bow – moving the bow from frog toward the tip. (p. 86)

Eighth Note – two eighth notes are 1 beat each; eighth note gets “1/2” a beat in 4/4 time. (p. 68)

Forte – [dynamic sign] Italian word meaning loud. (p. 17)

Frequency – the number of sound waves occurring in one second of time. (p. 38)

Half Note – gets 2 beats in 4/4 time. (p. 12, 37, 43)

Half Rest – rest for 2 beats in 4/4 time; looks like a hat. (Tip: *Hat* and *Half* both start with “H.”) (p. 13, 20, 42, 43)

Half Step – closest distance between two notes; fingers are close together on the fingerboard. (p. 54)

Key – first note of a scale; also called the tonic. (p. 73, 75)

Largo – [tempo mark] very slow. (p. p. 88, 89, 90, 91, 101)

Ledger Line – a small line that extends the staff; it can be above or below the 5 staff lines. (p. 29)

Legato – smooth and connected; marked with a slur. (p. 86)

Luthier – a person who makes or repairs stringed instruments. (p. 57)

Measure – the section on the staff between bar lines. (p. 59)

Mezzo Forte – [dynamic sign] medium loud; softer than forte, but louder than mezzo piano. (p. 17, 67)

Mezzo Piano – [dynamic sign] medium soft; louder than piano, but softer than mezzo forte. (p. 17, 67)

Music Alphabet – first seven letters of the English alphabet. (p. 7, 21, 22, 27, 51, 77)

Note Head – the round part of the note. (p. 12, 15)

Open String – playing a string with no fingers on the fingerboard. (p. 10, 18)

Piano – [dynamic sign] Italian word meaning soft. (p. 17, 38)

Presto – [tempo marking] very fast (p. 88, 89, 90, 91, 101)

Quarter Note – gets 1 beat in 4/4 time. (p. 12, 31, 32)

Quarter Rest – rest for 1 beat in 4/4 time. (p. 13, 20)

Repeat Sign – two dots in front of a double bar line; play that section again. (p. 59, 84)

Rest – musical symbol for silence; stop playing. (p. 13)

Rhythm – how long or short we hold a pitch. (p. 12)

Scale – 8 consecutive notes in a whole step and half step pattern. (p. 70, 75)

Skip – skip a finger on the fingerboard; skip a letter in the music alphabet; skip a line or a space on the staff; A skip on the staff is line note to line note or space note to space note. (p. 77, 80, 81, 83)

Slur – a curved line that starts and ends just above or below the notehead; means to play legato and all notes on 1 bow stroke. (p. 86)

Staccato – play short or detached; marked with a dot above or below the note head. (p. 87)

Staff – 5 lines and 4 spaces. (p. 15)

Step – the letter before or after a letter in the music alphabet; the line or space above or below a note on the staff; the finger number before or after a finger on the fingerboard. (p. 51, 53, 54, 55, 83)

String Quartet – four people playing together; most often 2 violins, 1 viola and 1 cello. (p. 9)

Tempo – speed; how fast or slow music is played. (p. 88)

Time Signature – found at the beginning of a piece; top number tells the number of beats in each measure; the bottom number tells what kind of note gets 1 beat; when 4 is on the bottom it means the quarter note gets one beat. (p. 59)

Tonic – first note of a scale; sometimes also called the keynote. (p. 73)

Treble Clef – violins read music using this clef; sometimes called the “G-clef” because the clef points to G line on the staff. (p. 23, 24)

Trio – three people playing together. (p. 9)

Up Bow – moving the bow from the tip toward the frog. (p. 10)

Whole Note – gets 4 beats in 4/4 time. (p. 12)

Whole Rest – rest for 4 beats in 4/4 time, or rest for one whole measure. (p. 13, 20)

Whole Step – 2 half steps together, space between fingers on the fingerboard. (p. 54)
